#### Our September Speaker

Master Gardener, Kathleen Sonnet is an advocate in sustainable gardening which is growing what you like economically while taking care of environmental issues. Knowing that many of us enjoy water loving blooms she suggested planting among them water loving vegetables like lettuce. Adding vegetables and herbs to one's flower garden can increase the overall beauty and keep those vegetable loving crawling pests under control. Marigolds, for example not only fill in nicely between tomato plants but also keep bugs away.

#### Our October Outing



Our October meeting at the SEA Lab introduced us to recovering sea animals, including lobsters, halibut and two foot sharks that could be petted. The

highlight was a tour of the California native plant lab by our scholarship winner, Trent Houston. The Sea Lab is planting California, Costal and Dune buckwheats along the coastal banks.

## CVD's October Speaker

At the first CVD meeting, Peggy Wormington told us she was so determined to understand the

Veronica that she has attempted to plant nearly every variety in her gardens first back east and now here! With time the number of varieties increased and now there is a variety for most soil types and temperature. There are even at least three California native varieties: Veronica alpine, Veronica cusickii and the Veronica americana. This perennial whose common name is Speedwell varies in size from small ground covers to taller clump forms with delicate flower spikes. Hebes are often mistaken for Veronicas and vice versa.

## Landscape of the Month Award

## October Shelby Houston and David Turner 4704 Paseo de las Tortugas

This newly landscaped garden began when the original house was completely remodeled. By completely removing the lawn, landscape designer Gina Bush developed the front garden into a drought resistant modern style, which correlates beautifully with the contemporary ranch architecture of the home. Trees, shrubs, ground covers and ornamental grasses show how foliage textures and colors can combine for beautiful effects. Crape Myrtle, non-fruiting Olive trees and Hopseed Bush serve as visually anchoring points that seem to divide separate areas of Gazania, prostrate Myoporum, Rosemary, Ajuga, Dymondia and Ceanothus ground covers. Agave, Phormium and Cordyline contribute structure, texture and dramatic form.

## September Dot Barclay and Diana Barclay Crane 202 Via Anita

This is a garden that never holds still. It first was lovingly created by mother Dot and has evolved under daughter Diana's artistic eye and care into a textured botanical tapestry. The surrounding slopes and sidewalk strip are covered with a profusion of shrubs, perennials and grasses that provide bold and vibrant color combinations. Many plants are creatively anchored with broken terracotta pots. With too many plants to single out and always a work in progress, this is truly a gardener's garden. Don't miss it!

#### Criteria for Landscape Awards

The latest Golden Gardens gives criteria for a new landscape design award. I was pleased to note that the tips agree with the way I have set up the joint RGC and RHA award, especially stressing the third criteria.

- 1. Divide the town into sections.
- 2. Drive by and judge the front yards only.
- 3. Select the best design. Trees and shrubs are acceptable. Colorful blooms are not necessary.
- 4. Take a picture of the garden or landscape.
- 5. Create a news article to accompany the picture.
- 6. Ask the householder to display for a month a "Garden of the Month" sign, which includes club identity. *Ruth Vogel*

#### Afternoon Tea with Jean



It was a beautiful fall day sitting in Jean Levanas' charming yard. It was difficult to believe that this graceful, lovely woman has had both a stroke and a broken hip this past year; her excellent

recovery continues. Jean and husband Leo (now deceased) have raised their family in this beautiful upper Riviera home they bought 53 years ago. A long time Riviera Garden Club member, Jean became an honorary member this year.

Born on Beryl Street in Redondo, Jean was delivered on the kitchen table by her Aunt Lillian (Dr. Whiting, a well-known local doctor). Besides her childhood home in Redondo Beach, part of Jean's growing up was done in Northern California in the ranching community of Avenal. There Jean helped around the cattle ranch, operating farm equipment and even learned to fly a plane. She later became a Cadet in the U.S. Nurse Corps, earning \$5 a month.

Future husband Leo and Jean met while she was a nursing student at UCLA. Leo was a chemist with Shell Oil. Later Jean also got a Counseling and Guidance degree at Long Beach State, going back to work after the children were established in school. Jean was a nurse at Torrance High School for 27 years. (Her first nursing job earned her \$135 a month.)

One of the interesting events of Jean's life was to be chosen to represent the South Bay in the Mrs. America Contest. The contest involved staying a week at the Hilton Hotel in downtown Los Angeles. Judging was done by the L.A. Times Food Editors in the categories of sewing, washing and ironing, ice sculpture and table decorations, as well as planning meals. Jean's masterpiece was a low cost lasagna made out of cottage cheese instead of ricotta and using low fat cheeses. Her efforts were rewarded with a washer and dryer!

Besides being involved in the Rivera Garden Club early on (holding many positions including president), she was also on the PTA Board and was a Torrance City Library Commissioner. Jean's favorite RGC job was making the money necessary for landscaping projects for local parks and libraries.

Jean's favorite flowers are roses with her favorites being the red Sexy Rexy and the lavender Sterling Silver. She says she has had a very happy life, her nursing career was very exciting and her religion (she is a member of St. Lawrence church) and family have been a blessing. Jean remembers that it was hard to recruit a Club president even in the old days, but took the position twice to keep the Club going. Thank you Jean!
