Ellen Meikle owner of Water Wise Garden Center, on Crenshaw Blvd., presented a program on landscaping with cacti and succulents. She made several interesting points as she presented different plants that are suitable for a water wise Garden. The following are a few:

- "Bees make 70 percent of our food. They are dying off and need plants that bloom. Aeonium produce flowers that they love."
- If you plant Echinocactus, indigenous to California, it will repel skunks and gophers.
- Grasses are a good addition to drought tolerant landscapes because they provide variety in shape and color. Most importantly, they provide movement.

RGC February Meeting— Succulent Vertical Gardens

Our February program was presented by **Sandy Chase**, a volunteer at the Huntington's Cactus and Succulent Garden. Sandy is a succulent aficionado! She taught us how to easily create a small, vertical succulent garden.

Sandy began with a wooden box she purchased from Home Depot's garden department. A simple frame can be made at home using cedar or redwood for the box. Staple wire screening to the front of the box.

Lay the frame on a table with the wire side down. First fill half the depth of the frame with dampened



peat moss. Fill the remainder of the space with a soil mix suitable for cactus and succulents. Sandy uses a 50% cactus mix and 50% pumice. Attach a wooden board to the back of the frame to hold the mix in place.

Turn the box to the front.

Create a pleasing design with plants. Use chopsticks or long nosed tweezers to make a hole in the moss for each plant. Crassula, echeveria, sedum, graphophylum, and kalenchoeia are examples of plants Sandy used.



Remember not to initially place the plants too close together as they will fill in over time. Keep the frame horizontal and spray the plants with water until they have rooted. It may take a month or so until you can hang the frame on a vertical surface. Some plants may not survive and need to be

replaced. The finished hanging garden should look attractive for many months.

be planted with *Asclepias* and other plants that butterflies can use for nectar and to lay their eggs. The workshop is from 4 to 5 pm on Wednesday.
