A LETTER TO HOMEOWNERS AND GARDENERS FROM A DANDELION

Hello, I'm a DANDELION

A lot of people call me a weed, but I'm a friend and have come to help you! My flowers are the first food for insects after hibernation and unlike most other plants,

I have pollen AND nectar, not merely one OR the other! And I am generous with them! When you see me, remember that I'm the ONLY plant who wants and can grow in that particular spot because:

- Either the soil is too compact or hard and I want to loosen it for you with my roots.
- Or there is too little calcium in the soil. Don't worry! I will replenish that for you with my dying leaves.
- Or the soil is too acidic. But I will also improve that for you if you give me the chance.
- Or a mixture of the above reasons, of course.

I'm here because your soil needs my help so it's best that you let me grow without disturbing me! When everything is fixed, I will disappear again, I promise!

Are you trying to remove me prematurely with my root? However meticulous you are, I will return 2 times as strong just until your soil is improved.

You can even tell by my growth at which stage my help is at. If my leaves are flat on the ground, then I'm far from ready but if they all reach up then I'm already a long way on my way.

Here are some completely different facts about dandelions:

I am one of the first bloomers in spring so I will announce spring / summer for you.

During the day when it's hot, I open my flowers. In the evening when it cools off,
I close them again quickly. In fact, if it's not hot enough during the day I won't open my flowers at all!

Did you know my flowers are even delicious to eat? I used to be called "honey (or gold) of the poor" because my flowers are so sweet in jam, sauce or salad! The internet is full of recipes. Check them out.

PETER LEE. HERB AND VEGETABLE PLANT SELLER AT THE FARMERS' MARKET

Have you ever wanted to grow vegetables or herbs from already germinated plants instead of from seeds? If your answer is YES, most likely you know **Peter Lee** who sells plants at the Redondo Beach and Torrance Farmers' Markets.

Peter grew up in Palos Verdes. As a young single man, rented a room at the historic Olmstead home which overlooked RAT (**R**ight **A**fter **T**orrance) beach on the cliffs above Malaga Cove. In those years Peter did landscaping work but soon became a participant selling vegetable and herb plants in the first local Farmers' Market in Redondo Beach in 1985. This original farmers' market was held at the location where Whole Foods Market is now. A few months later in 1985 Torrance opened its own Farmers' Market at Wilson Park, and Peter became a seller there too. Over the years Peter has sold his seedlings and vegetable starts at Farmers' Markets in Culver City, Venice, Westchester, Palos Verdes, Hermosa Beach, Torrance, Redondo Beach and Hollywood but now in 2023 he sells only at the two Torrance Farmers' markets, Venice, Redondo Beach and Hollywood.

Peter's days are busy propagating and selling plants but during his time off, he volunteers at Riviera Elementary School in the vegetable garden where each of his children either now or in the past have attended Riviera School.

Where are the plants that **Peter Lee** sells to the public grown?

Peter has leased one acre of land under the DWP (Department of Water and Power) utility lines locally. He explained that he propagates his plants outdoors in a cold frame, in the ground or sometimes covered with shade cloth. The plants take from 5 weeks up to 2 months of nurturing before they can be sold at Peter's space at each farmers' market. Peter said that deciding which plants to propagate for growing success is basically trial and error depending on the different climate zones of Los Angeles County. **Peter Lee** told this author about certain failures he had. He planted medicinal herbs for a customer who requested them but those specialized herbs did not sell well to the general public.

This author, **Marilyn Rubin**, is a vegetable gardener. I often buy seedlings such as tomatoes, squash, broccoli, cabbage, brussels sprouts or herbs from **Peter Lee** when I find that a pack of those seeds would give me too many plants for my small community garden plot.
